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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

"We grow too soon old, und too late schmart." I still have the ancient, heavy pot-metal cellophane tape dispenser I remember from my childhood home in the 1950's. And that saying is a decal on both sides of it. We old car guys and gals (old guys with old cars?) know the truth of that phrase, because, admit it! We are still learning.

My father was born in Oklahoma, child of a Alabama man whose own grandfather was in Company A, First Alabama Volunteers Cavalry in the Civil War. His mother was from Pennsylvania, and her grandfather fought for the North. But in the Tulsa, Oklahoma of my childhood, Jews, Negroes, Mexicans, homosexuals, and some Indians, were looked down upon. Discrimination, pure and simple. I was lucky to live through the '50's, '60's, and '70's of such radical societal change. Believe it or not, it started with my father, who constantly talked about "jewing them down", and used the N-word. But he raised us to respect even the different ones.

He was a parcel post carrier for the US Post Office. A member of the 45th Infantry Division in World War 2 and Korea, he had many Indian friends, and a few Black acquaintances. I recall several of them, but I want to mention one in particular. One afternoon he told me and my brother to get into the car with him. We drove to north Tulsa, where the "colored folks" lived. We pulled into the gravel driveway of a small house, with a decrepit one car detached garage. A husky Black man came out and they greeted each other warmly, and we were led to the garage. Inside was a stunningly beautiful 1930's car in immaculate condition. Dad and his friend from work talked about the car, as my brother and I were amazed at its beauty. That's when I wanted one.

In the late 1950's early 1960's, two men, from disparate backgrounds, employed at the same place, came together in a common hobby and admiration for wheeled beauty. One, a member of the Sons of the Confederacy, the other more than likely the descendant of slaves. But their love of cars transcended all. And that's what I love about our club - we folks with so many differences come together because of our love of the Model T in particular, and really old cars in general.

We all know there are different political, religious, cultural and other types of views in our club. *And it doesn't matter!* Because we're focused on the fellowship of the *cars*. While our nation is fragmented along so many different fault lines, we leave all that stuff at the door as we focus on what we have in common - our love of our cars. We don't talk politics, religion, the culture wars, or other stuff that might divide us. We have enough to talk about regarding cars: Model T's, Brass, Classics, you name it, our members own it, and we talk about it. We are a "Safe Haven."

A few years ago we were worried about our declining membership, but we are growing. We are growing because we choose to focus on what unites us, not what divides us. We discover, cherish, and celebrate our *common* humanity and love of old cars. So, my friends, continue leaving everything else at home. We're too busy having fun, together, with our cars, and friends.
















We were there because we entered our 1903 Cadillac in the Concours. And took First Place in our Class! That fire truck is a gorgeous work of art though!



We also strongly encourage national membership. Dues are only \$40 to the Model T Ford Club of America (P.O. Box 996; Richmond, IN 47375-0996).


